Josh Roeder— Josh Roeder passionately fights for people battling cancer in our community. Through his work at Texas Roadhouse, he supports Chemo Buddies cause by donating food throughout a cancer patient's chemo therapy treatment. He also gathered other restaurateurs to form "A Taste of Hope," which raises funds to support Chemo Buddies. Josh spreads love, compassion and good will throughout the cancer community. Kathy Rosa—Kathy Rosa is a tireless leader and advocate for the Tepe Park Neighborhood Association. As president of the neighborhood association she puts in countless hours to transform Tepe Park into a neighborhood where people want to live, work, worship and play. Under Kathy's leadership, the neighborhood association, has taken on the formal process of developing and launching a Quality of Life plan for the neighborhood, only the second of its kind in Evansville. Alan Winslow—Alan Winslow has spent 95 years in Evansville learning, serving and contributing to the betterment of our city. Yes, at 95, Alan actively serves many local and national organizations. Alan led the charge of Our Greater Community, which is now a part of HOPE of Evansville. He spent decades running the Neighborhood Economic Development Center and Patchwork Central. Outside of Evansville, he visited small villages in El Salvador to help residents gain access to potable water. **Dr. Linda L. M. Bennett**—Dr. Bennett strives to make USI a welcoming place for all students across the nation and world. As USI's third president, she established the university's first strategic plan, coordinated USI's first doctoral program and is a leader in bringing a multi-institutional medical school to Evansville. Dr. Bennett ensured the University supports our entire region through projects like the I-69 Innovation Corridor. Her leadership is an example to all of how to lead a major institution with skill. Ashlee Bruggenschmidt—As Principal at Sharon Elementary and founder of the Play for Kate Foundation, Ashlee Bruggenschmidt understands that when our local families are cared for, our community is stronger, whether that means helping to pay for students' medicine or ensuring all students get a present on their birthday. She does all of this while running a Title 1 school with a 4-Star School distinction by the Indiana Department of Education. **Carla Bunner Webb**—Carla Bunner Webb is a resilient, bootson-the-ground, lifeline to many suffering from unhealthy and abusive relationships. Kazee, University of Evansville President, works tirelessly with leaders of local educational institutions to merge the talents of each school to create Evansville Center for Health Sciences. Dr. Kazee was instrumental in working with a local group to preserve and move the historic Peters-Margedant House to the UE campus. The UE "Fellows" program was spearheaded by Dr. Kazee. In addition to all this, Dr. Kazee is involved with many local non-profits including the United Way, Southwestern Indiana Chamber of Commerce, Welborn Foundation, and WNIN Board of Directors.
